The town centre provides a wide range of bars which are located close to each other and can be reached by foot easily. Nevertheless, this day will be crazy for everybody because of the football game Germany versus Austria!

In fact the Germans are quite reserved and shy people, but when there is something about football they are getting weird. You will see, it will be amazing, especially if Germany wins, but against Austria it won't be a problem. So, prepare yourself!
