BeHIND THE SCeNe radio 98eins...

... went on air on the occasion of the first Greifswald International Students Festival (GrIStuF) in 2002. Having been not available for some months after the festival, it was resurrected in January 2003. At that time, however, it was only possible to broadcast via internet. As that situation was unsatisfactory for both the radio crew and its audience, plans were made to establish a permanent radio station with a "real" analog frequency. In January 2005, radio 98eins started broadcasting each evening from Monday to Friday on its own frequency. It can be received in Greifswald and its vicinity on 98.1 FM. During the GrIStuF, its slogan "Better in the evening" will have to be changed to "Better all day long", though, as we will broadcast non-stop 24 hours, reporting live, talking to the people involved, and looking behind the scenes. Our music will

make your day and most important, the GrIStuF e.V. will keep you up-to-date with our broadcast "Fahrplan", which will provide you with the actual festival guide for each day.

To produce the festival radio, the voluntary members of staff of radio 98eins work three times as much as usual. In exchange we will gain new experience through live coverage, make contacts with people from all over the world and we will surely have three times as much fun as usual. However, the technical realization of the festival radio is challenging and requires extensive preparation from all members of staff. All along, the radio is supported by its public relations team designing flyers and providing the local press with press releases. Only teamwork and close contact with the club of GrIStuF allow Greifswald's radio 98eins to broadcast for you better all day long!

House friend

26-year-young Martin Wilhelm from Germany studied in Greifswald Political Science until 2006. He was member of the GrIStuF-organization team 2005 and then joined, as the only Western European, the Serbian-team of ISWiB, International Student Week in Belgrade to support them with their second festival.

Did you have some special interest in Serbia before?

Martin: Not really. I do not know anything about this country, not the history, not the language. More exactly, I do not have any relations to Serbia. But I thought: 'Why not?' and go. I passed my last examinations between GrIStuF and Serbia, than I left Greifswald and wrote my thesis in Belgrade about "the political influence of pro-European-Union NGOs to the serbian governance."

And what did you finally get to know about Serbia during ISWiB?

Martin: It is a country, where you can experience history. The people have kind of a schizophrenic relationship not only to their country but also to the Europaeen Union (EU). On one hand, it did need years to break free from dictatorship, one the other hand, they are still caged, because the EU do not allow them passing their borders without lot of buero-cratics.

Besides you supported the students in Belgrade with organization. What was your task?

Martin: First we had to build a team. That was quite difficult, because the working morale is very different from this to the Germans, who like punctuality and discipline. The Serbians are not used to prepare things for longer periods, there was a constant change. So I try to teach them project management. But in the end we get it and could start the real organization. Here I concentrated on finding supporters and partners.

For example?

Martin: the city council of Belgrade, the German ambassador as patron and as its first civile action the national bank of Serbia. And lots of others.

Do you like the festival week?

Martin: Oh yes, a lot. It was very chaotic behind the scences, but nevertheless bombastic or 'hammergeil' like Germans say.

And do they organize a second festival?

Martin: Unfortunately it did not work the next time, although they want to make a source-meeting. But at the moment they are planning the third one. They already ask me for support.

And will you go?

Martin: I would like another experienced festival organizer to go there. Actually, I wish that the exchange of these people from other festival countries (I know eleven festivals like this) should become a permanent institution within the international student festivals.

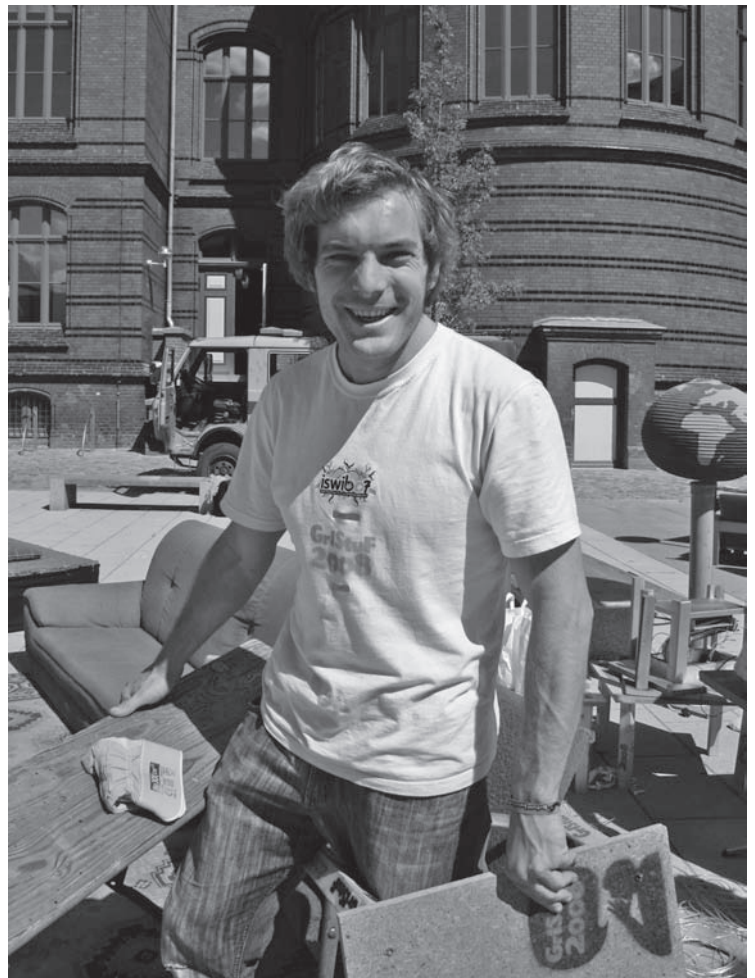
So, what is your next project?

Martin: At present, I am living in Valence, in France within the European Voluntary Service (EVS). Here, I organize seminars, concerts or daytrips to Straßbourg. It is all under the headline of european topics.

How did you get the EVS?

Martin: I really do not know. One day I got a message 'Hi, we want you to come to us'. I remember two simple applications, but I never heard of them again. Perhaps they found me in a database for volunteers. I registered my name on one, times ago.

Topic on

"Art and nature in urban spaces"



Saturday, when the last day of the students festival wind up, the townscape of Greifswald will have been changed. At least a bit, as promenaders will see by passing the grassland at so called "Museumshafen", museums dockside. The participants of the "Art and nature in urban spaces"-workshop intend to leave some seating-accomodation for relaxed persons and those who still want to become chilled there. The new sunbathing area should be about three multiplied by four metres large. First visitors will not only sit at dead wood

and metal but they will also be surrounded by living willows. So participants use organic just as inorganic materials designing the small 'urban space'.

As the museums-dock is a public place, old and young people are invited to pause there anyway. In Greifswald, this is an important meeting point, also because the port is home for arriving and passing ships. Hence the seatings should really bring together who already met each other at any event. The intention is to improve the

possibiltiy of human communication and art in urban spaces. Surely, there is not only the practical adavantage in the fore. At this grassland, there will be something adventurous, something you could sense, hear and feel. To put it in a nutshell, the art project intends to inspire everyone, who stop to relax on it. By no means there will be right angles.

Art emerge from nature and in nature. Of course this is not the only definition. This is what the participants of the workshop on their first day experienced. Support is therefore given by Michael Mai. The self-employed activity supervisor is an expert of using natural materials and guide the students by building their seating-accomodation.

At least until 2010 visitors will be offered the opportunity to test the seats. So, the city council of Greifswald promises. That incites the busy workers additionally, also because this workshop will leave most marks.

"Water Scarcity" And who are you?

Monday morning! The sun is shining! Everyone is excited, enthusiastic and hoping to have a week full of substantial work and cultural dialogue! The workshop "Water Scarcity" has 16 mixed members from very different countries of the world - Morocco, Algeria, Spain, Turkey, Sudan and Norway; just to name some. Highly motivated they met at 10:00 a.m. in order to deal with the optimal usage of water, individually and in general. How this could happen the week will show. What is most important to gain is the confidence of having equal partners to argue and discuss with. In little games in the backyard the group got to know each other, learned the names, heritage and the prime expectation of their fellow students. It was a very general and sociable first session. The participants had mostly arrived by airplane and had long trips to manage. It took one girl who started in York (UK) 14

hours to get to Greifswald! Rules for discussions were developed together in an intense talk about behavioural necessities. Everyone saw that the discussions need to be organized and after a short alternation of uncompromising statements a list of rules was hung up on a board. A moderator was described as important. Each one in the group kept the intention to accept the others and "change the world" as much as they can. During lunch time, the nicely packed lunch-bags were inhaled gracefully and talks became deeper and more vivid. People have exchanged their experiences in other countries, mentioned language-differences and barriers. After lunch which was nicely provided by the kitchen-team six papers were prepared.

The participants had to answer questions about perception regarding their different senses. Everyone made clear that they are interested in other cul-

tures and their contributions to the topic. They all want to make a positive change possible and intend to grow in mind as well as soul. Prepared for an active week they look forward to be heard and seen respectively.

"Energy Management"

The clock is ticking – when will non-renewable energies come to an end? The Workshop Energy Management is trying to find an answer to whether it is possible to bring up an alternative to what we have today. Fifteen visitors from all over the world are participating in the workshop. They come from Turkey, Hungary, the USA, Finland, Egypt - just to name a few.

The climax of this workshop will be the lecture of Prof. Dr Peter Schmuck who is an environmental psychologist. His lecture has the title "sustainable development – unrealistic 'trends' or actual opportunities for sustainable living patterns? The example of movements in bio-energy-villages in Germany 2000-2008. Peter Schmuck is working at different universities and societies in Germany, he published many books about sustainability and psychology of environment. The presenter of

this workshop is really happy, that Mister Schmuck accepted the invitation.

The two group leaders Anne & Julia are guiding the participants through a great variety of activities during the week. On Wednesday they will make a trip to a nuclear power plant and a Bio fuel power plant in Lubmin, which is approximately half an hour away from Greifswald. In connection to the title of the workshop the participants will discuss aspects of energy management and energy consumption, global warming and sustainability. On Monday the group was talking about non-renewable resources like oil, coal, uranium and gas. The focus was put on politics and current events influencing the market of non-renewable resources. The workshop was highly enjoyed among the participants. Kostik said: "I learned a lot from you tonight. It was really interesting especially be-



cause we came from different countries."

In the upcoming days the advantages and disadvantages of renewable energies will be the topic.

The aim of this workshop is to create a vision of a world with sustainable energy supply.

"Living spaces"

On our planet are living about 6,7 million people today. 195 states are part of the international community. To tackle global problems like limited resources or global warming, neither the national and transnational nor the international perspective countervail against them. World has to be understood as world society. If we just talked about social systems, the German sociologist Niklas Luhmann would have offered an explanation approach.

In the workshop "Living spaces", the participants go over and above those sociological approaches. They see human living as part of the ecology of the earth. Everything depends on everything and therefore human behaviour has to be explained in context with biological regularities. "The whole planet with all its species is ONE lively system", explains Inga, one of the workshop-leaders. The end of growth is reached. Now, this awareness has to couple into the people's mind. Con-

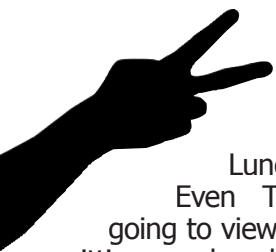


sequently, the aim of the workshop is to go away from the industrial growth-society towards a living sustainable society. Within the festival-week they will talk about three watersheds: the first one means, that unconventional protest is an instrument for installing a paradigm shift. The second one claims that only if the present system will be understood, we could discuss alternatives. And last but not least there is the conclusion, that a broad change of values also have to come along with this. During the argumentations the

three points are equivalent.

Concerning this topic it does not matter at all from which country the participants are. The worldwide problems are not only seen in the industrialized part of the world. But still the believe in the ability of changing the world is not distinctive yet. "There is a widespread powerlessness", says Felix, the other workshop-leader. It looks quite contrary to the participants: They do not want to look away. They care about our earth.

Trygve Thorson



Lunchtime in Greifswald. Even Trygve Thorson is going to view his lunch package, sitting on a bench at the former castle wall, which now is one of the most famous places in Greifswald for some relaxation. And for the participants of GrIStuF. "In Norway I am organizing a festival like this", he says. "But it has already a longer tradition."

It was in 1988 when students from the University of Trondheim the first time toyed with the idea of an international festival. On their opinion the Norwegian city should be more concerned with global issues. Trondheim with its 166.304 inhabitants and about 30.000 students is the third largest city in Norway. Besides the students wanted to engage in volunteer work. "It was a great opportunity for Trondheim and so many wanted to join them. So they try to gather students from all over the world in our town", states the 24-old student. Finally the ISFiT, the International Student Festival in Trondheim was created and then has been arranged every second year since 1990.

Firsthand at east and west

"The timing was lucky", Trygve says trying for a filled roll. 1990, short-time after the collapse of the former USSR, Trondheim was one of the first places, where west and east met right in the middle. Today ISFiT is the world's largest student festival with a thematic focus, whereas the issues always have been related to social and political topics with international relevance. But there are still more students from eastern countries involved in the festival. Even Trygve could not explain exactly why. "Perhaps, students from the 'west' are more focused on them-

selves, their education, their career", he suggests. The present president of ISFiT remembers a conversation with an albanian girl. "We talked about education and she told me that she has chosen her field of studies after what she thought her society need the most. I guess this is different."

From one to 450

At the beginning ISFiT was focused mainly on Europe, but this has changed over the years. What has not changed, is the positive tenor towards the festival. Within the beginning, a foundation was established, where the university, the city council of the Trondheim as well as other city institutions share in. "Even the Norwegian foreign ministry helps us, for example with inviting our guests from all over the world", Trygve is pleased. There are about 400 to 450 participants each time the festival starts. Twice as much volunteers from the university of Trondheim also join the organization teams.

Although „every ISFiT starts with one person", so Trygve tells us. After festival 2007, he was the chosen one. Actually, the Norwegian boy was elected with 118 votes to 79 in the Grand Hall at Studentersamfundet to be the president of the next festival. Afterwards it is the task of the respective president to set a new team. For his application, Trygve had to present a theme for the next festival. The student of Political Science and Social Anthropology wanted to go back to the roots and therefore decided for "peacebuilding".

Solving conflicts is not enough

Peace as a process is paid more attention not only by students but by every person. That's why the pre-

sident chose this topic. "It is not enough to solve a conflict. We need to think about how to prevent and to stabilize peace after a conflict", Trygve accounts. Thus ISFiT has offered dialogue groups since 1997. Within these groups students from selected conflict areas are invited to discuss and understand a conflict, also from the opponent's point of view.

Now, the president passes his time among others with getting mails from all over the world and writing mails to all over the world. "It is really nice to answer all this questions from prospective applicants", announce Trygve and smile. Every second year over 4.000 young people want to join ISFiT. So, a good piece of craftsmanship still waits for the organizers of the upcoming festival from 20th February 2009 to 1st March 2009.

And how did he get the idea of Greifswald? "Last year I participate in the Serbian festival and got to know some of the organizers. Now, I hope to meet some of them again, learn from them, develop ideas and change attitudes", Trygve explain. "By the way: A nice lunch box."

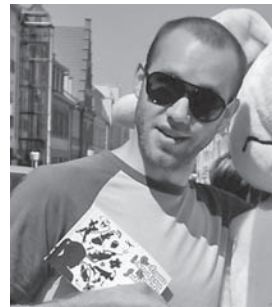
